There are very few things in life that we absolutely must do. A person does not even absolutely have to eat. A person, of course, must eat if he wants to live, but he can quit eating and die if he really wanted to. However, there are two future events that we cannot avoid. They are death and the Judgment. **Hebrews 9:27** says, "and as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment." These are two "appointments" that all of us must keep.

First, consider death. Our life here on this earth is, at the longest, very short. In **James 4:14** it is referred to as a vapor *"that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away."* To live is to eventually die. Since it is true that we all must die, the second mandatory appointment (the Judgment) should concern us all.

All of us must face the Judgment which will occur after the second coming of Christ. According to **2Corinthians 5:10**, we will be judged according to the *"things done in the body."* The Judgment cannot be avoided, so we should certainly prepare ourselves for it.

If you are not a Christian, you need to become one. The Bible teaches that a person must believe (**Hebrews 11:6**), repent (**Acts 2:38**), confess Christ (**Romans 10:10**), and be baptized (**Acts 2:38**). After a person becomes a Christian, he must remain faithful (**1Corinthians 15:58**).

There are thousands of directions we might have gone. With each of them there would have been work and preparation and they would have taken our time, talents and money. Even choosing to just drift along through life requires a certain amount of effort and focus. No matter what we chose to do, it would have placed obligations upon us.

Why then do so many think that choosing to submit to Christ leaves us with no responsibility or obligation? Making the decision to follow Christ means we must put our effort in to fulfilling that obligation. Following Christ will take our time, talents and money. It will require study and practice. That choice brings great responsibilities upon us. We will spend the rest of our life working to fulfill those responsibilities, for if we do not we will never reach the goal set before us by that choice.

Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord. **1Corinthians 15:58**

This verse does not just tell us to continue, it informs us that our steadfast labor is leading to something. We choose to submit to Christ because we know death and judgement awaits and we want to be prepared. For what? To receive the promised reward for our choice.
